It's the tale of a lawn of grass just after the grass has been mown. Each blade of grass observes that they have grown and that they are all the something-est. One is the tallest. Another is the curliest. One is the pointiest, silliest, crunchiest. One ends up being a dandelion. But Walt (a blade of grass) doesn't think he is the anything-est.

They are trying to figure out what Walt's something-est is when the lawn mower passes over again. Making them all the same. And in the cleanup Walt discovers he is the neatest. His something-est is being tidy. But it took a shared experience of showing his despair and than seeing that he was not alone to be able to move forward and discover what something-est was.

In celebrating each other's unique gifts and abilities, sometimes it takes seeing our shared human experience to help us discover who we are and what we are.

Each day you wake up, you are not the same person who went to bed. Every time you make it to your birthday you are a different person

than you were 365 days before. You may still be funny, or caring, strong, or calm. But while those are your traits that tend to stay over long periods of time, that does not sum up the whole of who you are. They are one aspect of a much larger and ever changing tapestry of you. As time passes you come to be caring in different ways, strong in different ways, calm in differ ways. 

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SPINNER SPINNER

For Pentecost, make a thaumatrope, a spinning toy that creates an optical illusion of motion.

What you need:

- White paper
- Cup
- Scissors
- Pencil and markers
- Plastic drinking straw



What you do:

- Using the cup's circular shape, trace two identical circles on the paper. Carefully cut them out.
- 2. In pencil, draw a person's head on one circle. Then place the blank circle on top and use the image beneath to guide you in drawing a flame above the head.
- 3. Color the two images with markers.
- 4. Apply glue to the backs of the circles and sandwich the top of the straw between them so it looks like a lollipop. Let dry.
- 5. Roll the straw quickly between your hands to view a mini motion picture.
